1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Late Chindhuji Laxmanrao Purke Shikshan Prasark Mandal's, Indira Gandhi Kala Mahavidyalaya is located at Tehsil place Ralegaon, District- Yavatmal in Vidarbha region of Maharashtra state. It is one of the most socio-economically, educationally, and industrially backward and drought-affected region. It is also one of the scheduled tribe tehsil in Maharashtra. The college was established in the year 2009 with the objective to provide higher education to the socially and economically weaker section of society. National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) accredited the college with a 'B' grade (CGPA 2.03) in cycle 1. The college offers a UG program B.Sc. & B.A. as well as Ph.D. program in Mathematics and Zoology. The college is committed for making students conscious of their social and environmental responsibilities through outreach programs and activities organized by the NSS unit, Electoral Literacy Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell, subjectwise student associations, etc. to enhance students social & environmental awareness and sensitivity towards the upliftment of the society.

Institutional Weakness

- English communication skill is average amongst the students.
- Less financial contribution from alumni because of their average financial status.
- Lack of self-learning habit amongst the students.
- Limited funding opportunities for research and innovation for affiliated colleges.
- Lack of student's involvement in using campus beyond the working hours and holidays.
- Being an institution offering conventional UG courses, students choosing placement opportunities are very few and opportunities for internships are limited.
- Student's progression for PG programmes is limited due to rural areas.
- Transport facilities are not adequate for the students.
- Dropout of girl's students due to marriage during degree education.
- The ideological narrowness of the parents is the barrier in the higher education of students.
- As no financial support from government agencies, improvement in infrastructure of college is halted.
- College is unable to implement best practices and extension activities as desired because of socio-economical problems.
- Because of lack of industrial growth in the region, it is difficult to provide employment to the students.

- Strengthening alumni engagement and networking for academic and employment pursuits.

Institutional Challenge

- Declining students enrolment in the college due to lack of transportation facilities in rural areas and students coming from long distance villages.
- Receiving the donations from the organisations, philanthropists and making provisions of the scholarships.

- Tracking the progress of the students after completing their UG education at this college is difficult.
- It is a challenge to fascinate meritorious students from other nearby Tehsils and Districts.
- The appropriate governance and execution of various activities and programs with existing number of teaching, supporting and administrative staff is challenging due to State Government's policy regarding the recruitments.
- To develop faculty-exchange, student-exchange, and Resource sharing programmes with institutions & organizations of repute.
- It is a challenge to motivate our students and staff to undertake online courses such as courses on SWAYAM, MOOCs, etc. because of poor internet infrastructure in residential area.
- It is a challenge to provide sufficient placement and internship opportunities to students due to its location.
- Execution of MOUs with foreign institutes and organisations.
- It is challenge to motivate Alumni for their financial contribution because of their weak socio-economic background.
- Guiding students to face competitive examinations interleaved with regular curriculum stress.
- Entry of many self-financial colleges from various universities in nearby areas.
- Students are from tribal and rural background, therefore, they lack interest in taking up jobs outside the region

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Our college is affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amravati University, Amravati and follows the curriculum and academic calendar prescribed by the University. The college offers B.Sc. & B.A. as undergraduate programmes according to the university curriculum. The semester pattern under choice based credit system scheme has been implemented with effect from academic year 2022-23. Along with these, some Add-on courses, Certificate courses etc. for which curriculum was approved by board of studies of college. The college has devised its own mechanism for the effective implementation and delivery of the curriculum with strict adherence to the University Academic Calendar. In the beginning of every academic year, IQAC in consultation with the College Development Committee prepares the academic calendar and allot the work to various committees, and restructures committees if required. The mechanism is designed & developed in a meticulous manner to encourage participative, collaborative & experiential learning. Some of the documents maintained for curriculum delivery include Time Table, Teacher's Academic Diary, Teaching Plan, Certificate Courses, Result Analysis etc. The teaching-learning method includes the use of ICT tools, assignments, seminars, unit tests, group discussions, fieldwork, and educational excursions. To make learning more productive and interesting, opportunities are provided to the students through subject-wise student associations and societies where students learn life skills develop competency and positive behaviour. The curriculum based on National Education Policy 2020 has been introduced by the affiliating University from the academic year 2024-2025.

The college library has access to e-resources through the Knowledge Resource Centre of the affiliated University. Students are encouraged to participate in various academic and research events like workshops, seminars, quiz competitions, and conferences; both, within and outside the institution to help students expand their intellectual horizons and develop relevant competencies. They are also sensitized about the issues like gender equality, human values, professional ethics, and environmental sustainability through curriculum and various activities. The college has a structured system for collecting feedback on the curriculum from all the stakeholders. The results of feedback are used to help findings ways to improve further. Analyzed feedbacks

and action taken reports are displayed on the institutional website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college is located in the socio-economic backward region of Vidarbha. The average enrolment of SC, ST, VJ, NT and OBC students is 96.87%. This demonstrates the commitment to provide access to education to socially & economically weaker sections of the society. The admission process is transparent and unbiased in line with the norms of the Govt. and affiliating university including reservation policy. The college caters to the needs of slow learners and advanced learners through special activities & programmes beyond regular academics. Student-centric learning methods such as experiential learning, participative learning, problem-solving methods, ICT-enabled learning and traditional learning methods are adopted. Teachers use ICT enable tools, prepare e-Content & PPT, Virtual Laboratories sessions and online classes through various platforms. The respective mentors give the timely interventions, counselling and guidance to the students.

The college has 17 number of full time and university approved faculty members during current year. Among the Faculty, 05 Teachers have Ph.D degree and of these, 03 are Research Guides. Average teaching experience of faculty during the assessment period is 7.65 years. The academic performance of the student is assessed continuously through unit tests, assignments, project assignments, seminars, field visits, semester end university examinations, etc. as prescribed by the university. The internal assessment and grievance redressal is done as per affiliating university guidelines.

Program outcomes and Course outcomes are defined by the affiliating university, which are further developed by the respective faculty of the college wherever required. Students are familiarized with Outcome-Based Education, right from Student Induction Programmes and subsequently through interaction by course teachers. Attainment of Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes & Course Outcomes are evaluated both directly and indirectly. Attainment reports are analysed and necessary actions are taken. The Average Pass Percentage during the assessment period is 67.93%.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College supports the Research and Extension activities and it is evident through the number of Research Paper publications. Our college has two university recognised research laboratories/centers and three university recognised supervisors for Ph.D. research work. The College has infrastructure, laboratories and library with internet facility. The college has a functional Research and Development Cell to look after the research related activities. The teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars, workshops, conferences, orientations and refresher programmes. 10 faculty members are doing Ph.D. research work.

The faculty members have published number of research papers in the journal of national and international repute with ISBN/ISSN Numbers, peer reviewed status and UGC care listed journals. The college has instruments and equipments to initiate research in the field of Science. The college has one sanctioned project from affiliating university under the scheme of Rajiv Gandhi Science and Technology for getting funds. The college faculty members have contributed chapters and units in text books of various publishers. The college has conducted workshops on Intellectual Property Rights, Entrepreneurship Awareness Camps and Skill Development. The college has framed research policy and code of ethics for conducting research.

The college organises various extension activities through full-fledged NSS Unit, Student Associations and

Societies and Library. Some of the prominent extension activities undertaken are cleanliness drive, tree plantation, 'swacchata pakhwada', blood donation camp, AIDS awareness and health check-up, Entrepreneurship development, Women entrepreneurship and women development through Bachat gat, Dental and Addiction awareness, free dental check-up, constitution awareness, legal guidance, etc. to cultivate moral, ethical, social & socio-cultural values among the students. In addition to this the college has also conducted COVID-19 vaccination campaign, COVID-19 RT-PCR test drive, Voter Awareness program, etc.

The college has executed MoUs with educational institutes and organisations for promoting research, collaborating academic and co-curricular activities, field visits/study tours, internship, etc. and most of them are functional.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has developed adequate physical facilities to support teaching – learning process in the institution like classrooms, laboratories ICT-enabled multipurpose hall equipped with LCD projectors with internet facility, two Research laboratories and internet facility/Wi-Fi facilities, 01 Interactive/Smart Boards and CCTV cameras. The maintenance of the College facilities is regularly done by the concerned college committee. The college has presently 12 class rooms, girls common room, NSS office, IQAC cell, staff room, spacious library, multipurpose hall, lavatory and toilet blocks, administrative office, Department of Physical education and sports, canteen and guard room. The college has well equipped laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Geography, Home Economics, and Indian music.

Also, college has ample infrastructures to conduct curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the campus with play ground facilities. The college has ample outdoor sports facilities like Volleyball, Kabaddi & Kho-Kho playground as well as indoor games like carom, table tennis, chess etc. The yoga sessions are conducted in multipurpose hall and on prayer ground. Different committees put their efforts to look after facilities and infrastructure of the college.

Clean and hygienic water supply is ensured and cleanliness is specially taken care of. Toilets and bathrooms are cleaned regularly. The college with the help of Department of Botany is developing and maintaining Botanical garden, campus plantation & greenery.

In addition to this, college has vehicle-parking zone, running track, fire extinguisher facility, E-Suvidha Kendra, Kitchen garden, Vermi-compost pit etc.

The college library has SARAL-Lib library management system. It has rich collection of text-books, reference books, journals, collection of literature books, Newspapers, Periodicals, Encyclopaedia, etc. The departmental libraries are also set-up for ready reference. The sufficient budget is allotted to the library for the purchase of books, journals subscriptions, periodicals & ICT tools as per recommendation of College Development Committee and approval of the Executive Committee. The college has internet connectivity through OFC with 100 mbps bandwidth.

The college prepares systematic plan for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic & support facilities – laboratories, library, sports & games, computer centre, classrooms, etc. in the beginning of every academic year.

Student Support and Progression

- The college has established equal opportunity cell to guide and help all the needy and eligible students for submitting their scholarship applications. It takes care of OBC, SC, ST, Minority scholarships.
- Career Counselling and Competitive Examinations guidance cell & Career Katta are established by the college. The college organizes various Workshops & Programmes for capacity building and skill enhancement of the student. The college has organized Regional level Workshop on English Communication and Soft Skills, Yoga practices and physical fitness, Nutritional week & Nutritional Diet Recipe competition, Water quality analysis, Certificate course on food adulteration, Covid-19 vaccination program, Dental check-up, Blood Test, Wild vegetables & fruits exhibition, medicinal plants exhibition, Aids awareness program, Addiction free campus, etc.
- The college has organized various programmes for creating awareness about trends in technology such as Workshop on e-resources browsing, How to make Power-point presentation, Creating e-mail and Introduction to Google Drive, Cyber-crime, LIBMAN software training, Awareness about Google Classroom, Use of Google meet, ZOOM meet, Teachmint, Google form, Virtual Laboratory session, Referencing style APA, etc.
- Effective Grievance Redressal Mechanism is in place to ensure timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging instances. No cases of ragging/sexual harassment reported during the period. The college has set-up Internal Complaints Committee and Anti-Ragging Committee for preventing and timely redressal of such instances. The committees organizes periodic meetings, workshops, awareness camps, guest lectures, etc. for strict implementation of policies, guidelines and zero tolerance limit with reference to above instances. The awareness regarding these issues is created during student induction program, which is organized in the beginning of every academic year for first year students. The undertaking regarding these issues is taken from every student in the form of declaration at the time of admission.
- The college has provided both online platform through college website and offline platform through manual form for the submission of student grievances. The college has also installed suggestion boxes and designed SOP for the same.

Response:

The Indira Gandhi Kala Mahavidyalaya, Ralegaon, affiliated to Sant Gadge Baba Amaravati University is located in a semi-urban area providing higher education to the students of socially and economically weaker sections of society. It is a co-educational institution having the privilege of offering undergraduate degree courses in both Humanities- Arts and Science & Technology streams with eighteen departments. The College has an Academic monitoring Committee, which monitors the implementation of curriculum and its delivery as prescribed by the affiliating University with the support of the IQAC.

Academic Planning:

1. At the beginning of the academic year, the principal with all heads of the Departments finalizes the academic calendar.
2. The time table is framed by the time table committee as per workload and University guidelines.
3. Heads of Departments conduct meetings with faculty members to finalize departmental time table after workload distribution.
4. An induction program is conducted for the new batch of students every year.
5. In the pandemic period, colleges switched over to the online mode for the conduction of curricular and co-curricular activities.
6. Teachers are appointed as in-charge of various committees for effective execution.
7. Continuous monitoring of the students is a part of internal assessment.
8. Faculty members are available after class hours to clear the students doubts.
9. Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes are well-defined and made available through websites. Progress of the syllabus and curriculum delivery is reviewed from time to time.
10. Guest lectures of eminent academicians are organized.
11. Institute encouraged teachers to attend orientation and refresher programs in respective subjects to

acquaint themselves with the depth of theory, practical and reference material. It is further supplemented by various workshops, teachers' training programs, and short-term courses conducted by Academic Staff Colleges and other institutes.

12. ICT facilities and resource material support from Library i.e., e-resources through K. R. C., S. G. B. A. University, Amravati for the effective delivery of the curriculum.

Thus, the institution's process of curriculum delivery is well planned, well documented, and hence very effective.

Continuous Internal Evaluation Process:

The continuous internal evaluation of students is carried out as prescribed by the parent University through the common test, home assignment, seminar, group discussion, projects assignment and study tour and visit to the educational institution.

To conduct the common tests, timetables are displayed one week in advance on the notice boards. The syllabus for Internal Assessment is announced a week in advance by the concerned subject teachers. Faculty set the question paper by considering the university syllabus and university examination pattern. The answer papers are evaluated. The evaluated answer sheets are returned to the students to analyze their mistakes and improve upon their performances.

Apart from written tests, students are also given opportunities to deliver seminars, writing assignments, group discussions, and project assignments to broaden their skills. Departments also inspired the students to participate in seminars and other academic activities organized like project competitions, seminar competitions, Quiz competitions, etc. by University and institutions to raise their academic performance and skills

In the faculty of Science and Technology, the college has eight departments, seven class rooms and one smart classroom, four laboratories and a Botanical Garden. In the faculty of Humanities, the college has nine departments, five class rooms, three laboratories, and a Kitchen Garden. Staff Welfare meet: The college Staff Council Committee had organized the Welfare meet cum awareness programme with the Staff of Life Insurance Corporation of India, State Bank of India Insurance and Shriram Life Insurance on the various schemes.

Gymnasium: Gym is also accessible to teaching and non-teaching staff.

Institution Performs Appraisal System for Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff:

The Prime motto of the college is to provide quality higher education to students. To achieve this, college has a performance appraisal system to assess its human resources on a regular basis. The college encourages each faculty member to take up activities related to teaching-learning and evaluation, co-curricular research and extension, skill development, professional development, etc. The college follows a Performance Based Appraisal System as prescribed by the affiliating University and Government of Maharashtra.

Teaching Staff:- The performance of each faculty member is assessed according to the Annual Self-Assessment for the Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS). Promotions are based on the PBAS

proforma for UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) that is based on the API score. The institute undertakes a wide range of activities besides academics, for which faculty members are assigned additional duties and responsibilities. The PBAS proforma filled by the Faculty Member is checked by HOD and verified by the IQAC. Faculty members whose promotions are due are recommended based on their API score and are required to appear before the screening-cum selection committee constituted by affiliating university.

The finding of students feedback analysis are communicated to concern staff members through IQAC for further improvements.

Non-Teaching Staff:- All non-teaching staff is also assessed through annual confidential reports. The overall assessment is based on the cumulative grade by the HOD, which is then forwarded to the Principal. On the basis of confidential reports, non-teaching staff are recommended for their promotion.

The provisionary budget is prepared every year.

Resource Mobilization Policy and Procedure

Before the financial year begins, Principal and Heads of Departments prepare the college budget. The budget is scrutinized and approved by the CDC. The financial statements and grants received to the college in every financial year are certified by the auditor. Adequate funds are utilized for development and maintenance of infrastructure of the College. Some funds are allocated for social service activities as part of social responsibilities through National Service Scheme.

Institution conducts external financial audits regularly. Our Institution has an effective mechanism for auditing the accounts. The accounts of the college are audited by chartered accountant regularly as per

the Government rules. The budget sanction is taken from the College Development Committee. External Auditor verifies all receipts, expenses bills, payments, etc. of the financial year. External audit is carried out once in a year. The last external audit was done in 2023 and audit report was satisfactory.

Utilization of Resources:

1. During the pandemic, the college completed social responsibility by conducting a vaccination drive for students, staff, and local residents.
2. The college also provided infrastructure and a playground for organizing University level Volley-ball competition at zonal level.

Response:

IQAC is one of the major policies making and implementing unit in our college. It assesses and suggests the parameters of quality education. The College along with its IQAC team has taken numerous steps for the growth and development of faculty members and students.

However, following are the two examples of best practices institutionalized:

Mentor Mentee scheme:

The college has mentor mentee scheme for monitoring of students' academic performance and solving their financial, economic, social etc. problems. In this scheme, allotment of faculty members as a mentor for each student is done after completion of admission process in every year. In our college, mentor(full time teacher): mentee approximate ratio is 1: 36.6. Mentors organized meeting of mentees allotted to them. Monitoring records are maintained by mentor teacher for each student is checked by IQAC. The IQAC also takes review of mentor mentee scheme activities.

Stakeholders Feedback:

The IQAC of the college designs feedback form for collecting feedback from students, teachers, parents and alumni on curriculum, institute and physical facilities. The designed form is discussed in the meeting of head of departments and then forwarded to CDC through IQAC for recommendation. The form is finally forwarded to management for its final approval. The IQAC through class teachers distributes feedback to all admitted students in online/offline mode as desired by the stakeholders for collecting necessary information and data.

Academic review through periodical meetings:

- The IQAC conduct periodical meetings with College Development Committee, the principal, the Head of departments and Coordinator of Committees throughout the academic year in the presence of the IQAC coordinator.
- The Chairperson of Academic Monitoring Committee conducts an academic review of all departments through collecting information on academic activities, such as completion of course, unit tests, assignments, seminars, group discussion, quiz and other activities.

Use and enrichment of ICT infrastructure

- The use of ICT tools has become an integral part in teaching -learning process.
- IQAC always encouraged teachers to utilize these tools in class rooms and laboratories sessions
- IQAC prepares the plan to include the use and enrichment of ICT infrastructure expecting from each department.
- The educational use of social media has also been utilized to establish communication with the students.

Response:

“EMPOWERMENT OF RURAL AND TRIBAL STUDENTS BY INCREASING THEIR RETENTION IN HIGHER EDUCATION”

The distinctiveness of the college is to understand the educational problems of rural and tribal families, help them and suggest the probable solutions to improve the enrollment of their wards in higher education. In our college, both in Science and Technology as well as Humanities faculty students enrolled are belonging to rural and tribal communities. The IQAC of the college has studied and identified following problems of rural and tribal communities.

1. The tribals are even today under clutches of manifold superstitions, beliefs, wrong dogmas etc.
2. There is a lack of awareness regarding role and importance of higher education.
3. Many tribal families are poor and cannot afford expenses for sending their wards to institutions of higher education. This also leads to non-attendance and dropouts of students in college.
4. There is a lack of transportation and communication facility in many tribal areas.
5. In many tribal communities, parents give minimal importance to girls education due to social and economical limitations.

Therefore, we have decided to change the mental setup of tribal community for looking at higher education through proper counselling and various programmes. The college through its IQAC is resolving the above mentioned problems of the rural and tribal community in following ways.

1. The role and importance of higher education is explained and discussed with the parents of rural and tribal students during admission, counselling and parents meet.
2. The college is motivating and helping the tribal and rural students for submitting their applications for getting educational scholarships through various Government departments and other agencies. The college also allows students to pay the college fee in instalments as desired by the students. The concession in paying college fee is also offered to needy students.
3. The college is making regular correspondence with state transport department located at Ralegaon for providing bus facilities as per college schedule. The college also helping students to get admission in Government hostels located at Ralegaon. The communication belonging to rural and tribal area is done through class wise whatsapp media groups.
4. The college through its IQAC organizes various programmes focusing on gender equality, gender sensitization, Women Right, World Women’s day for students and their parents. The college also gives equal opportunities to girl’s students in games and sports, cultural activities, Youth Festivals, student tours, field visits, NSS activities, extension activities, etc. with counselling and consent of their parents.
5. The emphasis is on entrepreneurship in the area of local and traditional business and service sector, rather than pushing students to seek jobs. The college in collaboration with MCED (Maharashtra Center for Entrepreneurship Development) putting efforts in imparting entrepreneurship training and awareness about business opportunities.

College has also conducted certificate courses on Organic Farming, Renewable energy resources, add on course in biochemistry & value added course in qualitative aptitude etc. for improving student’s employability, entrepreneur and professional skills.
